## KEEPING OUR HISTORY

In July we had a display in our gallery called *A Photohistory of Webster Groves Parks*. It took the combined efforts of several Library staff members, several Parks Department staff members, and even people from City Hall to make this display a reality. This is the third historical display we have done, and we are already planning the next one.

We are also working on our next historical video. We premiered the first one last year called *Tracks in Time*, a short history of the railroads in Webster Groves. Our next one is a history of the Webster Groves Lions Club.

We have been working with the Webster Groves Historical Society to bring some of their archived materials to the Library, so we can catalog them and make them available to our patrons. We also hope to scan and/or digitize much of this material. We just subscribed to a product which is meant to make it easier to post digitized historical images to our Website.

The Rotary Club of Webster Groves was recently awarded a grant to make available to the Library better scanning equipment and more cabinets for storing archival materials. We are anxious to begin that work.

As you can see, preserving our city's history is a big job, and we cannot do it alone. We have had to partner with quite a few organizations to move the work forward. But we believe that it is worth it, because Webster Groves is a city rich in history, and many of its residents know this and are proud of the fact.

Of all the sources we can dig up and scan or index or digitize, there is none more important than the memories of people who have spent their entire lives in Webster Groves. We invite you to visit us, to offer us your memories. Often the things we hear from people correct mistakes; often they open up entire new avenues of research—they are always interesting.

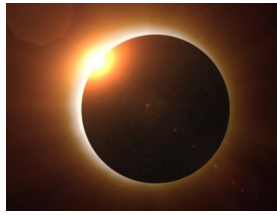

## TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE

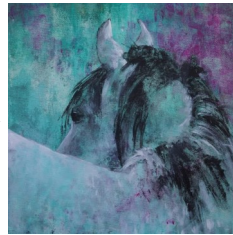

In the meantime, we still have plenty of eclipse viewing glasses to hand out. Because the glasses come with some safety warnings about their use, we will only give them to adults.

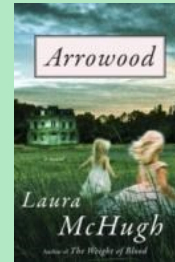
## LINDSAY HIGA EXHIBIT

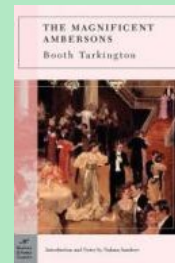

## AUTHOR STEPHEN KLING DISCUSSES THE BATTLE OF ST. LOUIS

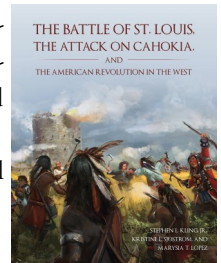


On Saturday, September 16 at 2 p.m., author Stephen Kling will visit to discuss his book *The Battle of St. Louis: The Attack on Cahokia and the American Revolution in the West*.

This comprehensive and well-researched book tells the little known history of the battles in and around St. Louis and along the Mississippi River, when the Americans and their Spanish allies defeated attacks from the British with their Indian mercenaries. Despite the little coverage this history gets, it was of

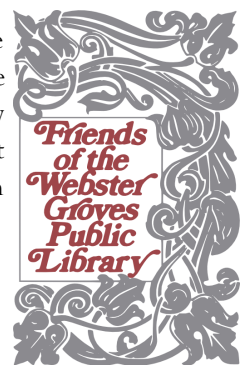
major importance in establishing the geographical extent of the United States after the war.
