'VANISHED WEBSTER GROVES'

Kind of a provocative title, isn't it? Don't worry, we are not announcing any eminent disappearance of our beloved community, but a new historical display going up this month in our gallery.

Vanished Webster Groves looks at all the buildings and homes, even some natural places, that used to be here but are not now. We have many of them, some recent enough that people remember them, some that perhaps no one alive has ever seen. It is an interesting trip through the early history of Webster Groves.

There are two things to note about the exhibit.

One is that an exhibit about things that are no longer here presents a special challenge—namely that we cannot go out and photograph things that no longer exist. We have to find an existing photo, copy it, and identify it. When we tell people about what we're working on, they often mention something they remember being here once upon a time. But if we don't have a photo of it, we can't feature it. A popular example of this is the Velvet Freeze ice cream parlor that was in business for many years in Old Webster.

We just cannot find a picture of it, so we cannot use it.

The other thing to note is that we are looking at things that no longer exist, not that have changed hands. The building that houses San Jose Mexican Restaurant on North Gore used to be a Two Nice Guys restaurant, and before that The Artichoke, and who knows what before that. It's a credit to our sense of historical preservation that so many old buildings in town have housed, and continue to house, a succession of businesses.

But it doesn't always work out that way, and many buildings have been torn down, lost to fire, replaced by something else. That is the focus of our exhibit.

The exhibit was created by Library Director Tom Cooper and Adult Services Librarian Deborah Ladd, with research assistance by Systems Administrator Tim Nix.

Vanished Webster Groves will be viewable throughout July, with a special preview during the 4th of July parade.





Our suncatchers were also an example of repurposing or upcycling—making something fun and new out of items that might be other-


