Yesterday, we put up a display of music boxes in the front foyer. Many of them are Christmas themed—Christmas trees, Santa Clauses, snow globes, etc. They are whimsical and pretty, and make a nice display.

We also started working on a Christmas tree made out of books—it's a fun thing we've seen a lot over the past few years. Debbie, who has been working on it, reports that building one turns out to be more difficult than it looks. When she's finished with that, she will attempt an 'Olaf,' the reindeer from *Frozen*, also made from books. We are optimistic at this point that both projects will come off splendidly.

It's fun having a big place like a library to decorate. Lights and garlands and trees everywhere make December a festive month. When I first came to Webster Groves Public Library, in these many years ago, I asked staff members to fill out surveys listing what jobs they do: and yes, I wanted to know who was responsible for holiday decorations. Experience tells me that in any work environment, there is someone who takes on such tasks.

For many years, that job fell to Pat Linehan, our long-time Adult Services Librarian. She was creative and good with such things, and her work made the holidays special. Pat retired this year, and that work passes to others.

We live in politically contentious times. People seem to want to make an argument out of everything. I once worked at a library where we put up a Christmas tree, and a patron came in and challenged us with the question, 'What is this?' We could tell she had an axe to grind, but didn't know which edge she was sharpening. Did she want us to say that it was specifically a 'Christmas tree,' and not a 'holiday tree?' Or did she want us to remove it altogether? I think in the end the director of that library told her 'it's an artificial tree with ornaments hung on it, make of it what you will.'

I'll never understand people wanting to argue over something as fun and festive as holiday décor. We put it up, we enjoy the sight of it and the happiness it brings during a cold winter month, and we're a little sad when January rolls around and it all comes down.

FRIENDS NEWS: BEYOND THE PAGE FEATURES KENNETH JONES



We hope you will join us. Until then, enjoy curling up with a good book in this blustery winter weather.





