THE LIBRARY AND THE CITY

The April 4 election includes Proposition R, a property tax increase meant to enhance pensions for police and firefighters in Webster Groves, as well as other City employees.

Whenever there is such an issue on a ballot, Library users ask us about how it will affect us here at the Library. It does not affect us at all. We are also members of the statewide LAGERS pension system, but they require us to have our own account with them.

The Library is a separate taxing district from the City of Webster Groves. Our income is derived from a different tax base, and we have not asked for any tax increases in over 8 years, not since February 2009.

We do have several areas where we cooperate with the City, because it makes good fiscal sense. We pay an annual fee to the City's Finance Office to do our payroll. We are also part of the same benefits package as City employees, including medical, dental, and life insurance—we get much better rates that way than we ever would trying to go it alone in the benefits market. The Library is self-governed by a board of trustees. The trustees apply using the Boards and Commissions Application that is submitted to the city clerk's office. When seats on the Library Board are available, the mayor and city council appoint new trustees. Library Board trustees serve three-year terms, and can serve three terms.

Beyond appointing members to the Library Board, the mayor and city council have no official capacity to direct what the Library does. Of course, as representatives of Webster Groves citizens, they always have an advisory role, and there is always one councilmember who attends all Library Board meetings. Councilmember Toni Hunt is our current liaison.

This is all done according to provisions in the Missouri State Constitution. If you have any other questions about how the Library and the City relate to one another, just send us a note!
