THE LIBRARY AND THE MONDAY CLUB

On Monday, October 9, at noon, the Monday Club of Webster Groves will hold a ceremony commemorating the 100th anniversary of their building at 37 South Maple Avenue. They will unveil a Century Plaque, though the plaque is a bit late-the building opened in 1911.

The club itself is much older. Established in 1887 by Sarah Allen, they met for a long time in members' homes, where they talked and learned about important issues in art, science, and politics. The Monday Club of Webster Groves is the oldest women's club west of the Mississippi River.

Because of their focus on learning, members of the club felt keenly the lack of a public library in the growing community of Webster Groves. Since 1884, there had been public reading rooms, arranged mostly under the auspices of First Congregational Church, with the support of the Monday Club.

The church added a new sanctuary in 1893, including space for a reading room, a place for men to spend their leisure hours without recourse to saloons. But the committee charged with overseeing the library despaired of this mission in 1908, and closed the reading room in autumn of that year.

Jennie Jager was a member of the Monday Club, and she and her husband William were both members of First Congregational. They donated the lot at the corner of South Maple and East Cedar Avenues for a club building, with the condition that it include room for a public library. When the club building was dedicated in 1911, a new public library was also dedicated.

Webster Groves citizens approved the city's first library tax in 1927, and the Library moved to its new location in the High School in 1928. But the relationship between the Monday Club and Webster Groves Public Library remains an important part of our history.






