LOCAL HISTORY NEWS

It seems there is so much happening regarding our efforts to organize more of our local history. Several things happened in the past month.

The Webster Groves Historical Society loaned us several items, including bound copies of old Webster Advertiser and Webster News-Times newspapers. These augment the donation we got this summer of a nearly complete run of the Webster-Kirkwood Times.

We are in the process of organizing all these things, and that is, as you may imagine, a long process. Helping in the organization process, we recently got a new file cabinet that was given to us by the Rotary Club of Webster Groves. The Rotary is also providing us with new scanning equipment to scan and index a multitude of images and documents dealing with the history of Webster Groves.

One of the interesting things we have learned, and continue to learn, is that the thing people most hope to find is information about their own houses, and the thing we have the least information about is people's houses. Unless your house was a famous one in Webster Groves history, there is very little reason someone would have taken photos, or written anything about it. Quite a few houses are listed in the Historical Society's Webster Walks pamphlets, but again, if your house is not listed there, we likely can't tell you much about it. We do have microfilms of old tax records and building permits, and these are minimally helpful in house research.

We will continue to work on compiling well indexed and searchable archives of local history, and we will also try to compile the best index we can of information about local homes. But it does seem that this will always be the hardest thing to research well in our archives.

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STORY TIME WITH HIGH SCHOOL VOLUNTEERS

Several weeks ago our Children's Department was approached by a Webster Groves High School cheerleaders mom, Angelica Taylor. The girls were looking for volunteer opportunities in the community and thought the Library would be the perfect place, and we agreed!

Beginning on November 18th, students from the High School will present a monthly Saturday Story Time and Craft at the Webster Groves Public Library at 2:00 p.m. The group has expanded to not only include cheerleaders but members of the student council and other organizations within the High School. The students will remain in the Library after the story and craft for any kiddos that would enjoy some one-on-



one reading time or STEM activities with a high school age friend.


STEM LAB PROGRAMS


