OUR HISTORICAL ARCHIVE

In the past few months we have been working on compiling an online archive. We have a lot of historical records, some that we own, some that are loaned to us by the Historical Society. We are going through these things and creating little units of Webster Groves history that we think will be appealing to people.

So far we have units on trains in Webster Groves, the history of our police department, the first four churches in town, and early television stars who made their homes in Webster Groves. These are multi-media units—they are mostly photographs and copies of old news articles, but they can also include videos. The unit on trains includes a video we created last year.

Also last year we received a donation of the whole run of the Webster-Kirkwood Times, and a loan of many bound volumes of old newspapers from the Historical Society, including the Webster News-Times and the Webster Advertiser. It has been fun and enlightening to just flip through these newspapers to find articles and photographs dealing with local history.

It is also interesting that sometimes, we don't find much of what we're looking for. Recently we thought it would be fun to create a unit on the history of Old Orchard. But after a few weeks of looking, we didn't come up with many new or interesting items about it, so we'll just do something else.

Sometimes we learn things that we didn't know before. For instance, we found that there was once an Old Orchard Mineral Water company. There was a natural spring that flowed beside a home in Old Orchard, and the water was bottled and sold. It fact, the water won the award for the best mineral water at the 1904 World's Fair. Today, the spring is covered over, though the family that lives in the house is well aware of its history. This history is also related in one of the Webster Walks guides, published by the Historical Society.


