We ordered all the protective supplies a while ago, and though the supply and delivery chain is very slow, some of it began arriving this week, so a second box is close to being checked.

The figures from the County are not looking good yet, but we're optimistic. We have to be.

When we reopen, it will be in stages. First will be the circulation-only stage. You can come in to get books and movies, but nothing else. We will be asking everyone to wear masks, to maintain safe distance from each other, to limit the number of family members who visit at a time.
