#### **COVID HISTORY ARCHIVE**

Last month we announced that Webster Groves Public Library would be gathering information for a COVID History Archive. The idea is to keep a record of how families, businesses, churches, clubs, schools, and other local entities endured the pandemic—a resource for future generations. We have been very happy with the results to far.

Some of the input has been just what we expected: many of our local churches have their own archivists, or communications directors, who sent in pretty detailed summaries of how their congregations got along for the pandemic months.

The Webster-Kirkwood Times, which underwent a tumultuous year, sent in articles dealing with the paper first discontinuing its print edition and then coming back into print, remaining as a resource of news and information during these trying months.

But there have been some unexpected things. One woman, who described herself as a dancer, sent a lovely poem about experienc-

### oster ing a year without engagement with live mu-

sic, theater, or dance. Another budding poet sent an ode on the death of her neighbor from COVID-19, along with a few other poems she wrote early in the pandemic.

One man sent a message noting a trend which has been commented on more than once—that in the isolation and break from our usual daily activities, some people found time to complete long neglected projects. He brought us a copy of the journal *Nineteenth Century*, which included an article he had been meaning to finish for 40 years!

I hope everyone will keep the submissions coming. We will organize and file all these materials and make them available to anyone who wants to read or study about this important time from a personal, local perspective.

#### **REOPENING STATUS**

New guidelines about masks from the CDC last month were both a relief and a source of confusion. We are happy that there is a diminished need to wear masks in many public places—but we are also a close contact, indoor space that entertains vulnerable populations such as seniors and children. For the time being, we still ask that Library visitors wear masks; we are insisting that unvaccinated visitors wear them.

This applies to children. As you know, children under the age of 12 have not been vaccinated yet, and we ask that parents bringing them to the Library have them wear masks. This is for the safety of your children as well as our own staff.

Past that, we are taking steps to move forward. We will reopen our Meeting Room in June, starting with groups of 40 people or fewer, during our current business hours, and not yet allowing refreshments. If you have such a group that needs to meet, please call 314.961.3784 and ask for Paige or Tina.

We will also resume our usual Sunday afternoon hours starting June 6. We hope to see you soon!
