A few years ago Dwight Bitikofer, former publisher of the Webster-Kirkwood Times, gave us his personal collection of the paper. He had issues going back to the founding of the paper in 1978. After organizing them, we found there were nearly 200 missing issues scattered over the decades.

We recently worked with the current publishers of the paper to fill in most of those blanks, and now we are only missing 25 issues.

During the pandemic, our reference depart-

ment staff found time to organize all those papers. A generous grant from the Friends of the Library paid for archival boxes and other materials needed to store them safely.

We also created an index to the paper, so you can easily look up articles going back to the earliest days of the Webster-Kirkwood Times.

MLCARPA GRANT



The Municipal Library Consortium (MLC) has been granted \$225,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. The grant, administered by the Missouri State Library, is earmarked for the purchase of e-books and audiobooks for our OverDrive collection.

LIBRARIES RESUME PASSPORT SERVICE

On July 6, Webster Groves Public Library will begin making appointments for passport applications. Our friends at Kirkwood Public Library started passport service a few weeks ago. Both libraries had paused accepting passports during the COVID-19 health emergency, and will be taking passport applications by appointment only, in order to manage the anticipated rush.

Neither library takes passport photos. You must visit a store such as Walgreen's, CVS, or Walmart for that service.

We have heard from the U.S. Department of State that the wait for a passport to be delivered, after the application is mailed in, can be up to 18 weeks, due to a considerable backlog. Even when applicants pay the extra fee for expediting a passport application, the wait can be 12 weeks.
