NEW RECIPROCAL AGREEMENTS

Soon, the libraries of the Municipal Library Consortium (MLC) will sign reciprocal agreements with Jefferson County Library and Scenic Regional Library. These agreements expand which libraries our patrons may use, and who may use our libraries. This move was approved by the library board at a recent meeting, and it's just a matter of completing the paperwork.

Many people who live in Jefferson County work in areas of St. Louis County served by MLC libraries—including Webster Groves Public Library. There are also likely to be people living in Webster Groves who work near libraries of Jefferson County Public Library. Soon, they will be able to get library cards at those libraries and use them for free.

The same is true of the patrons of Scenic Regional Library, which has locations in Franklin, Gasconade, and Warren Counties.

Given our long-standing reciprocal agreements with St. Louis County Library, St. Louis Public Library, and St. Charles City/County Library, it is increasingly easy for residents of Webster Groves to find free library service anywhere in our region.


