THE LIBRARY AS POLLING PLACE

The week before an election, a huge cage of voting equipment is delivered to the Library. The next Tuesday, the meeting room is transformed into a polling place. It is abuzz with activity and lines of waiting voters may trail out the door, down the steps and along the sidewalk. Political signs crowd together at the edge of the lawn and often there are volunteers who eagerly greet the voters and Library patrons as they walk up. Parking places are at a minimum and the second shift staff may have to park way down the street. Inside the Library, it is different too. There is an air of excitement as staff members debate how many people will eventually vote here, will there still be a line at 7:00 when the polls close, and who will win. Staff members joke that there are patrons that we only see on election day and it does seem busier.

Long-time library users may remember that back before the renovation, when the meeting room was the children's room, the Library was a polling place. But instead of having a dedicated place for the election, voting

Can you believe that as of this month, we have been in the newly renovated and expanded Library building for ten years already? Our renovation and

expansion took place between 2010 and 2012. As many of you may recall, there were some serious setbacks along the way, and a project that was meant to take less than a year took all of two years to complete! That meant that the Library stayed in its temporary quarters in the old Seiler Instrument Building on Brentwood Blvd. for much longtook place in the Library's reading area on the east side of the Library. It did cause some confusion. Furniture had to be rearranged and as these were the days before cell phones, poll workers took over the Library's telephone system as they called to check on a voter's registration. People wanting to check out books would have to maneuver their way through a line of voters that could extend all the way along the circulation desk and down the hall to the restrooms. It was understandably noisy and not much serious studying could be done that day.

Now that the county board of elections has given the approval to vote at any county polling place, it does seem like the meeting room is busier on election day. Perhaps voters are multitasking their errands. But we are happy to have it. Having the Library as a polling place may create some disruptions, but it is an honor and a privilege to be part of the political process.


