## **CREATING FERTILE SOIL**

I am retiring soon, after 37 years working in libraries—17 years as director at Webster Groves Public Library. Preparing for this, I moved a while ago to Millstadt, Illinois, where I bought a house with a three-acre lot. I have tilled up a few large garden areas, planted several fruit trees, and set up a beehive; I will staff it with a queen and her minions come spring. I have always enjoyed gardening, and now I will have plenty of time to spend on it.

Reflecting on this, I am remembering something I heard years ago on NPR. They were interviewing a man who was an expert on soil, such as one uses for gardening. 'When you're a farmer,' he said, 'you're in the soil business.' I couldn't agree more. I have been working with soil, and mulch, and ground covers to create the perfect beds for various vegetables and fruits to grow.

Why do I bring this up here? Because it also reminds me of a conversation I had years

ago, before I was a library director, with my manager at the time. She was a little uncertain about her own performance, and since we were pretty close, as professional colleagues go, she asked me if I thought she was doing a good job.

I told her yes, she was (I am nothing if not diplomatic), but I also elaborated on my thought that the job of a library director is not to run every program and every service in the library: it is to create the environment in which professional people can do their best work. Make sure they have good staff, make sure they can afford solid library collections, make sure the library's finances are in order and the building they work in is sound and comfortable and inviting for patrons.

So, you see, it's like gardening in that respect; creating the best soil for things to grow. I hope that over the past 17 years I have come close to accomplishing that goal. *tcooper@wgpl.org*
