MOODY COLLECTION

In the month of July you will find pictures and documents from the Kate Moody Collection in the Library's art gallery. The Library, in conjunction with the Webster Groves Historical Society, has been working to digitize this collection. The Kate Moody Collection consists of over 10,000 documents assembled by Katherine Twining Moody, a librarian with St. Louis Public Library from 1895-1945. A resident of Webster Groves, she collected photos, newspaper clippings and other documents dealing with the history of the city. The collection also contains genealogical material and reflects some of her interests. These items were collected from the 1880s until her death in 1950. These items are available online, for free, for anyone to access, no account or library card needed, on the Missouri Digital Heritage website.

UPDATING JUVENILE LIBRARY CARDS

In order to comply with <u>Missouri Regulation 15 CSR 30-200.015</u> and receive state funding for the Library, the Library will be asking all parents and guardians to update their children's library cards. To update these accounts, parents and guardians will need to come into the Library and sign off on a new form acknowledging that they are responsible for the materials their children check out on juvenile cards. This form will also be required for any new juvenile library cards. We hope to get as many cards updated this month as we can, because on July 31st, any juvenile card that has not been updated will expire. The expired cards will need to be updated before the card can be used again.
