DIRECTOR'S CORNER

October 5-11 is Banned Books Week!

This year, Banned Books Week takes place from October 5th through the 11th. I've written about this for the past two years, and I will continue to write about it every year because Banned Books Week is incredibly important. Talking about it—and about the freedom to read—is vital.

The freedom to read is a foundational pillar of the public library and is also essential to our democracy. Yet, it has been continuously challenged. People's rights to express themselves, to choose, to speak, and to read have been questioned, restricted, and even suppressed both historically and in recent times.

This is why we must continue to talk about the freedom to read and why we can't stop.

I truly believe that books and stories play an integral role in our society and in the world. Books do more than entertain or inform us—they help us see ourselves reflected in their pages, and they help us understand others as well. The freedom to read allows us to walk in someone else's shoes. It builds empathy and understanding, mitigates fear, encour-

ages open-mindedness, and allows us to think and feel more broadly. It helps us look beyond ourselves and care more deeply for others and for the world.

At the public library, we strive to create and maintain collections that offer access to diverse materials representing a range of content and viewpoints. We also continually work to foster creativity, belonging, learning, innovation, growth, and community.

It is always my hope that anyone who walks into the library feels welcomed and that they can easily find something that interests them, helps them, or excites them.

Banned Books Week is a reminder of why the freedom to read is so vital. It reminds us where we've been, the challenges we continue to face, and the importance of protecting this freedom in our everyday lives.

programs. Kudos to Nancy Leahy, Friends President Sue Gold, and the rest of the planning committee for a great evening!






